The March 12, 2022 meeting of the Buckeye Woodworkers and Woodturners was held at the Northwest Family Recreation Center in Akron, Ohio. There were more than 50 members attending the meeting. Today's demonstrator will be Ron Tomasch. Ron will be demonstrating how to turn a bowl in a bowl.

Marshall Holmes welcomed all to today's meeting.



Marshall reminded all that the BWWT video library on the website is password protected and the password has been changed. It is important to not share this password with anyone who is not a member of BWWT as this could jeopardize having professional demonstrations done for BWWT recorded and available on the website.

Marshall recognized Gayle Seymour and Ben Darrah for all of the work in setting up the improved audio visual system and the technology required to implement Zoom meetings for members who are not able to attend meetings in person. This has been a huge challenge and their determination to get the right equipment in the right place at the right time has really paid off. In addition, they make sure the system is set up before each meeting and the video presentation comes off without a hitch. Thanks go to both of them.

Marshall reminded members that BWWT will be having a group purchase of woodturning tools and equipment with Woodturner's Wonders. Anyone wanting to purchase woodturning supplies can do so starting today. Orders can also be submitted at the April meeting. Full payment is required when the order is submitted. Orders will be delivered at the May meeting.



Marshall asked members to set aside July 23 and 24 for the Akron Art Expo at Hardesty Park. The City of Akron has asked BWWT to set up a demonstration booth during the event. This will be similar to the demonstrations done at the Hartville Hardware tool sale. We will be needing demonstration turners and greeters at this booth. Stay tuned for further information.

Marshall also announced that the April meeting will feature Tom Olichew demonstrating how he makes his handled flask.

work with the audio/video set up and operation is interfering with the donut procurement. Since this is a critical part of each meeting, (try to explain to more than fifty people why there aren't any donuts) we need to have someone step up for this. Jack Boggio is putting together a tool making hands on class. The class will consist of making a tool handle, adding a quick release tool holder and making a tool. Cost and dates for the class have not been determined, so stay tuned for more information.

He has brought to the club for anyone who is interested the instructions for making the bowl along with enough precut segment pieces for anyone to make a bowl. **Bowl in a Bowl Demo

Ron introduced himself today as a member of 5 woodturning clubs in Ohio and Pennsylvania. He has been turning wood for many years. Today's demonstration will be a bowl in a bowl, a demonstration he first saw done by Todd Raines of Texas.



Ron started out with a piece of camphor that was about eight inches round and four inches thick that was mounted between centers. He started by turning the outside shape of the bowl, stressing that it must be as


spherical as possible. As he turned closer to a spherical shape, he checked his progress with a template frequently. He emphasized that being spherical will have a large impact on the appearance of the wall thickness of the two bowls. When he was satisfied with the shape, he cut a tenon in the bottom so that he could mount the bowl in a chuck for hollowing.



The next step was to reverse the bowl in a chuck and hollow the inside. He hollowed the bowl to about a 1/2" thick wall so that it would appear that each bowl was about 1/4" thick when he was done. In order to simplify the hollowing, he used a parting tool to locate the inside edge of the rim; this would prevent the gouge from skating across the rim of the bowl. As he was hollowing, he frequently checked the wall thickness with calipers.



When he was happy with the hollowing and sure that his wall thickness was correct, it was time to remove the tenon and finish the bottom. He mounted the bowl in a set of Cole jaws for this. As he was cutting away the tenon, he frequently checked the bottom to be certain that the bottom continued the spherical shape of the of the rest of the outside of the bowl.



The last step in making the bowl was to cut the detail that would simulate the bowl in a bowl. In order to do this, Ron had a cup chuck that he had made to fit bowls that he had previously made. He only had to make a slight modification to it to fit this bowl. He first used the bowl to get an idea of where he had to change the cup chuck and then modified it so the bowl would fit.



After the bowl was fitted into the cup chuck, Ron used a Rubber Chucky live center to hold the bowl in place. The bowl was offset slightly so that the illusion of two bowls could be cut. Ron used a pencil to mark approximately where the offset cut would be so that he could determine where the outside bowl would be. He advised that the more offset the bowl was in the cup chuck, the larger the difference in the two bowls would be. With the way the bowl was offset, the difference was about 3/4".



The next step was to cut the profile of the rim of the inside bowl. Ron advised to run the lathe as fast as you would feel comfortable because with the offset, all the cuts would be intermittent. By running at high speed with a freshly sharpened tool, the smoothest finish would be achieved. After he had the inside rim cut, he used a point tool to cut a thin line to delineate where the two bowls would meet. He followed that up by using a sharp piece of ebony to burn in a black line to darken up the thin line. One could also use a piece of formica to burn in the line.



This was just another opportunity to make a bowl with just a little different twist. Thanks go out to Ron for this demonstration. Be sure to see the [full video on the BWWT website](#).
